ACMNA Annual Meeting

Neighbors, News and All Things Arcadia

On March 2, 2019 ACMNA hosted its 32nd Annual Meeting at Prince of Peace Lutheran Church. The event gave neighbors the opportunity to chat with one another, enjoy some breakfast and hear about the numerous projects the association has been involved with in the last year.

The meeting was opened with the presentation of colors by members of Boy Scout Troop 6. As an added treat, Eagle Scouts Calvin Eng and Max Lunifeld played a violin/cello duet of the National Anthem.

The first order of business was a tribute to Craig Steblay, who is stepping down after 5 years as AC-MNA president. (Craig will remain on the board.) Tristahn Schaub, the incoming president,







presented Craig with a signed photo of the board members. The 2019 slate was then presented, and was voted into office.

A few highlights from the meeting:

- Tristahn Schaub addressed the construction variance process and the criteria ACMNA uses to craft a
 position statement. He also explained the new construction guidelines that ACMNA developed, with

- Tristahn also provided an update on the 56th Street SAVES and Connects Project.
- Jared Sherman, our Phoenix Police Department Community Action Officer, explained how important it is be vigilantly watching our neighborhood. Your diligent reporting can help our police link similar cases that hopefully end in an arrest! Officer Sherman awarded a Ring doorbell system to a lucky attendee.
- Ed Bull of RED Development discussed the redevelopment plans for CamelSquare (NW corner of 44th and Camelback). RED has been meeting with leaders from surrounding neighborhood groups and is working with them to address their concerns. (Watch for more info in future newsletters.)
- Scott Covey, Parks Supervisor, talked about the recent addition of Camelback Mountain to the Phoenix Mountains Preserve.
- Councilman Sal DiCiccio addressed several issues including the Cholla Trail parking congestion, the condition of city streets, and budget issues. The meeting ended with Sal taking some questions from the audience.

Safety tips from Officer Sherman

Highlights from our annual meeting

Arcadia is part of the Mountain View Precinct, which encompasses 46



square miles and more than 201,000 citizens. Just 252 sworn officers cover this large area, but targeted crime suppression programs and proactive partnerships between police and neighborhoods are working to reduce crime. In 2018, the precinct saw a 19.9% decrease in burglaries and a 5.8% drop in motor vehicle thefts.

Officer Sherman shared several examples where community tips and doorbell video footage led to the apprehension of criminals. He urges all citizens to be vigilant in working to fight crime.

What can you do to help?

- Keep doors and windows locked, especially at night.
- Consider installing a video doorbell or other surveillance system. These devices are relatively inexpensive.
 Video not only deters crime on your property, but recorded footage can help police find and convict criminals.
- Lock your vehicle and never leave valuables inside.
 Even when parking in your garage, do not leave keys in the car.
- Report ALL suspicious behavior to the police. Don't worry that you are wasting their time—it's what the police are paid to do.

Phoenix Street Maintenance

City wants your input on road repairs



Tired of rough, bumpy roads? Relief is on the way. In 2015, voters approved T2050, a comprehensive transit plan that expanded investment in bus service and light rail and allocated \$200 million to street improvements. The Phoenix City Council has recently backed an initiative to accelerate pavement maintenance projects on the City's major streets, requesting that the 5-year plan be completed in just 2 years.

The Street Transportation Department is currently developing a new work-plan and is looking for citizen input. They've created an interactive street maintenance map that residents can use to drop a "pin" for specific road conditions (such as rough pavement or potholes). This data will be used to prioritize projects. Visit Phoenix.gov/PavementProgram.

The Streets Department also offers the following advice and warnings:

- Expect more road construction on major streets (such as Indian School Rd, Camelback Rd, 44th St and 32nd St.)
- Restrictions will begin occurring in early spring, and continue through late fall. Winter temperatures, even though mild, are generally too cold for asphalt projects.
- When driving in construction areas, obey all posted signs and keep your speed at or below the limit. Stay focused on the road and your surroundings at all times.
- Be patient and allow extra time. Keep in mind that the end result—nice smooth roads—are worth a little frustration.

Candidates discuss plans for the City and Arcadia


