### **ACMNA Annual Meeting Recap**

The ACMNA Annual Meeting held on March 18, 2023, was a productive gathering that discussed several crucial topics and provided updates on exciting developments in the neighborhood.

#### Love is in the Air



Spring is mating season, and that includes the roof rats in Arcadia. Roof rats actually have 4 – 6 litters per year (of up to 12 offspring). Now is a good time to review your roof rat control actions. First, you should be removing food sources – pick citrus trees, bring pet food dishes indoors at night, keep garbage and recycling bins closed, and limit

the use of bird feeders and sweep up seed debris in the evenings. Place out bait stations such as the <u>Protecta Sidekick Rat Bait Station</u>, baited with <u>Tomcat</u> <u>With Bromethalin Bait Chunx Pail</u>. Check them once a week. For complete information on roof rat control, see <u>Roof Rats in Arcadia</u> on the ACMA website. Roof rats are never going away, so continuous control of their population by homeowners is needed.

# Palm Tree 101

When your palm trees send out seed pods, it's time to get them trimmed. Unfortunately, most palm trees in Arcadia are over-trimmed. Imagining the fronds at the top of a palm tree as a clock, they should be pruned to the 9-3 o'clock position (at most, 10-2 o'clock position). Over pruning may cause unusual tree growth, or worst case, kill the tree.

Recall that palms are not desert or arid plants. They require a lot of water and fertilizer. During their vigorous growth months of May to August, they should get a three-foot deep soaking in a six-foot wide basin every ten to twelve days. Fertilize monthly with an application of ammonium sulphate. See the July 2022 issue of <u>Arcadia Central</u> for more information on palm tree care.

## Mosquitos: Bite back with these strategies!


Last summer, Arcadia experienced a mosquito infestation, and with the recent cool and wet winter, this summer doesn't look any better. Mosquitoes can not only be a nuisance, but they can also transmit diseases. There are two genera of mosquitoes found in Arizona: Culex and Aedes. Of the 40 species identified, only a few carry diseases of concern, such as West Fill in ruts in lawn Nile and St. Louis encephalitis viruses. Mosquitoes must have water to complete their life cycle, and controlling water suitable for breeding is the most important mosquito control strategy.

Here's a three-part strategy for reducing mosquitoes in the Arcadia area: breeding control, adult mosquito trapping, and mosquito repellents. Mosquitoes will lay eggs on the surface of water, on the sides of containers, or on damp soil. This includes mud puddles, bird baths, outdoor trash cans, landscape ponds, pet water dishes, and more. Standing water from monsoon rains or irrigation water will cause increasing mosquito populations. Mosquito eggs laid years before may hatch and result in adult mosquito swarms in as little as 48 hours after flooding irrigation or monsoon storm.

To control mosquitoes on your property, fix outdoor leaks, fill ruts in lawns, keep fresh water in bird baths, remove standing water in wagons, play pools, and sandboxes, remove water from pool covers, reduce watering in areas that develop standing water, clean out gutters, and otherwise inspect for standing water. In addition, the use of larvicides can be successfully used by homeowners to control mosquitoes.

Products to attract egg-laying mosquitoes and kill the larvae are effective. Place these on the perimeter of your property, away from outdoor recreation areas. Known effective products are the In2Care Mosquito station, the Ovi-Catch<sup>™</sup> AGO Mosquito Trap by Catchmaster, and the BG-GAT trap by Biogents.

Adult mosquitoes can be killed with pesticides such as permethrin, deltamethrin, and etofenprox. These are usually applied via fogging and need to reach mosquitoes where they shelter during the day. Mosquito traps to attract adult mosquitoes can also be effective, but they



should be placed on your property away from recreation areas. Note that cheap "Bug Zappers" are ineffective against mosquitoes and only kill beneficial insects.

Overall, controlling breeding areas and using traps and repellents can help reduce the mosquito population in the Arcadia area.
